## **Exemption Category 1**

Research, conducted in established or commonly accepted educational settings, that specifically involves normal educational practices that are not likely to adversely impact students' opportunity to learn required educational content or the assessment of educators who provide instruction. This includes most research on regular and special education instructional strategies, and research on the effectiveness of or the comparison among instructional techniques, curricula, or classroom management methods.

Normal Educational Practices		
<ul> <li>Activities that typically occur in a classroom/educational setting and would occur regardless of the research.</li> </ul>

<ul> <li>Instruction is routinely used and/or considered proven educational best practice for the target population.</li> </ul>		
Studies not eligible for Exempt #1 include:	Additional Definitions/Notes:	
<ul> <li>Studies requiring significant amount of time for edu- cators and students to implement and/or impact edu- cator's ability to instruct/deliver normal content.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Studies involving children will be assessed to deter- mine the vulnerability of the population and may not be eligible for Exemption.</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Randomizing subjects to different conditions is not a normal educational practice.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Studies requesting waiver of consent/parental consent may not be eligible for exemption given other state</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Including additional activities that are not normal ed-</li> </ul>	and federal laws (e.g., FERPA).
